donated to support the Chicago Public Library Foundation since 2021, helping community-based nonprofits leverage the library's assets.

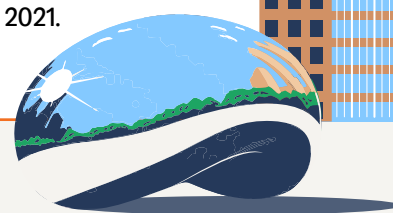
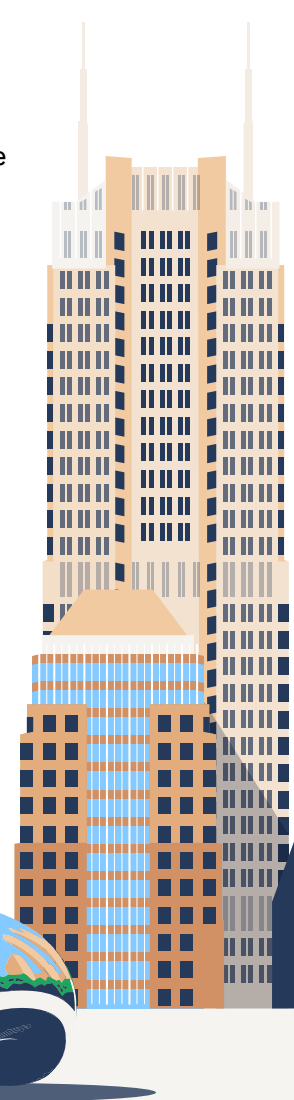
