Securing Safety: Temporary Protective Status



This guide will walk you through the steps for applying for Temporary Protected Status or TPS. To determine whether applying for TPS might be right for you, please consult the accompanying Amazon Fact Sheet regarding TPS and the USCIS website.

Most people can apply for TPS without the help of an attorney using this guide. However, you should contact an immigration attorney for assistance rather than filing without help if you:

- Have a criminal conviction or arrest,
- Answer "Yes" to any of the inadmissibility questions found in items 8-41 of the Form I-821,
- Are in Immigration Court proceedings, or
- Cannot easily show how long you have been in the United States.

Otherwise, this guide can help you assemble a filing packet with relevant forms and evidence.

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Temporary Protected Status At A Glance



Sometimes, the United States will grant temporary protected status or TPS to the citizens of a country experiencing a crisis or natural disaster that have been residing in the United States since a certain date. TPS allows qualifying people from countries designated for TPS to live and work in the United States while they have TPS. Though TPS is not a path to a permanent immigration status in the United States, TPS can sometimes be renewed. **TPS has specific country requirements for each designated country.** USCIS maintains a current list of countries on its website under "Countries Currently Designated for TPS."

Who Is Eligible for TPS?

You can request TPS if you meet the requirements for:







To confirm that you are eligible for TPS:

- Make sure that your country of origin is on the list of countries that the US government has designated or re-designated for TPS. USCIS
 maintains a current list of countries on its website under "Countries Currently Designated for TPS." You generally must be a citizen of a
 country designated for TPS to qualify.
- Look up the dates that you are eligible to file for TPS. **USCIS maintains a specific webpage for each country** that has a TPS designation. Your country's page should have a chart that looks like this one:

Have you been primarily living in the United States since the date listed as "Continuous Residence in US Since" for your country's chart?

If you were spending most of your time in another country after this date, you cannot obtain TPS.

Have you been present in the United States without interruption since the date listed at "Continuous Physical Presence in US Since"?

If you left the United States after this date—even for a short trip abroad to visit family or similar—you cannot obtain TPS.



I-821 | Application for Temporary | Protected Status

- To file either for an initial TPS or to renew your prior grant of TPS, you will need to submit Form I-821 to US Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS).
 - USCIS regularly updates its forms, so it is important that you download the current version directly from USCIS' website
 shortly before you make your filing.
 - Much of the information on the Form I-821 is basic biographical information that should be easy for you to complete.
 - USCIS instructions are available here and may address questions that are beyond the scope of this guide.
- While USCIS does permit you to file the Form I-821 electronically on its website, you should make this filing in paper form by mailing materials to USCIS if possible.
 - Why? USCIS' electronic systems can be frustratingly unstable, and you may lose progress on your application if you cannot finish it in one sitting.
 - You should always make and keep a copy of all the materials you submit to USCIS, which is easier if you submit materials in
 physical format.
- If you want to work in the United States while you have TPS, you should file a request for an Employment
 Authorization Document or EAD alongside your TPS request. You can request an EAD using the separate Form
 I-765.
 - You should generally include the completed Form I-765 in the same filing packet as your completed Form I-821.


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Include all other names ever used, including maiden/married names and any alternative spellings of your name.

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On this page, you will provide information regarding your entry into the United States. For guestion 1.b you need to give a date since which you have "resided in" the United States, meaning having lived here mostly full-time.

Identify any other countries that you visited or passed through along your route to the United States. For example, if you had a layover in another country, you would need to list that country in answer to question 2 and then list the dates and your immigration status in that country for questions 3 and 4.

Question 5 is aimed at understanding if you were ever offered something like refugee status, asylum, or permanent residence in another country that you refused to take.

If "No," skip questions 6 and 7.

If your answer is or may be "Yes," consult with an immigration attorney before filing for TPS. You will need to carefully describe the circumstances for that status in surrounding questions (6 and 7). A lawyer can help you understand if and how having status in another country might impact your TPS.

If this is your first time seeking TPS, you will file an initial TPS registration request. An initial TPS filing must include extensive evidence and documents to prove your eligibility for TPS on three facts:



Fact #1: You are from a country designated for TPS

To prove this, collect whatever documentation you have regarding your identity and nationality in one of the following designed countries.

- The **best evidence** is a passport from your country of origin, even if that passport has expired.
- If you do not have and cannot easily get a passport, you should collect alternative documentation like a national ID card or a birth certificate showing your country of origin.
- Ideally the documents you use should include your photograph and fingerprint.
- Documents in languages other than English should include a copy of the original and a certified English translation.

X Do not submit original documents to USCIS!

An initial TPS filing must include extensive evidence and documents to prove your eligibility for TPS on three facts:



Fact #2: You have been living in the United States since the "Continuous" Residence" Date.

To prove this, collect documents that prove you have been living in the United States since the date required for your country.

- You need to show that you have been living primarily in the United States since the "Continuous Residence" date for your country, which you can find on the country-specific TPS page on USCIS' website. In looking at "residence," USCIS will examine whether you have been primarily living in the United States during that **period**, rather than spending weeks or months abroad.
- If your relevant entry to the United States was through a port of entry like an airport or land border crossing, the best evidence is usually your I-94 arrival and departure records found here which you can retrieve using your name, birthday, and passport information.
 - Those I-94 records should show a nearly-complete history of your travel into the United States in the recent past.
 - Be aware, however, that sometimes those records are incomplete or inconsistent, in which case you will need alternative evidence such as flight receipts or evidence that you were renting an apartment or home here from a certain date.
- If you entered without inspection (i.e., were not formally admitted to the United States), you should provide documents that demonstrate how long you have been here in the United States.
 - For example, did you enroll your kids in school or sign a lease agreement for an apartment once you arrived in the United States? If so, paperwork from your child's school or from the apartment might be able to show that you have been here since that date.
 - Other possible ways to prove this can be found in the I-821 Instructions available here.



An initial TPS filing must include extensive evidence and documents to prove your eligibility for TPS on three facts:



Fact #3: You have been physically present in the United States without interruption since the "Continuous Physical Presence" date.

You will need to show that you have been in the United States without interruption since the relevant date for your nationality. That means you need to show that you have not traveled abroad since that date to any country, for any period of time for any reason. The sole exception to this rule is if you traveled abroad using "advance parole" tied to a prior TPS grant.

You should try to collect and include as much evidence as you can along the following lines:

- Your 1-94 records showing that you have not reentered the country in the relevant period.
- If you own a home or have been renting, documentation showing that you have been living in the United States continuously.
- Copies of all pages of your passport to show a lack of entry/exit stamps for other countries during the relevant period.
- Tax records showing that you filed yearly taxes during the relevant period.
- Bills that you have paid consistently each month during your stay in the United States (e.g. water or electric bills).
- Bank account statements showing that you have had an account continuously during the relevant period.



What If Cannot Find This Evidence?

If you are struggling to find documents to establish these facts, that does not mean that you cannot pursue TPS. It may be possible in some cases to explain a lack of evidence using a declaration in which you explain why a document is missing and explain the issue. In that instance, you should consult with a qualified immigration attorney who can help you assemble that kind of alternative evidence.



What to File for TPS:

You may need to include additional documents if you have criminal convictions, last resided in a TPS-eligible country but are not a citizen of it, or if you have other special circumstances. Please consult an immigration attorney for help in these cases.

- Form G-1145 to receive a text or e-mail notification when USCIS receives the application

- Late initial filers must fill out three additional parts of the Form I-821 and explain why they failed to register during the initial period. For more details, please consult the USCIS TPS page on "Late Filing."

You should carefully review that everything is in order before sending it to USCIS.



Initial TPS Application: How to File



Each TPS packet must be sent to a specific mailing address. The correct address can vary based on your country of origin, where you are physically located in the United States, and how you are sending your package.

- Please pay close attention to any address differences based on where you are located and how you will send the package!
- For example, Venezuelan nationals must file in a different location if they are in the state of Florida.
- There are also different addresses if you use FedEx, DHL, or UPS to send your package than if you use the US Postal Service.



Be sure to send your TPS application to the correct address to ensure proper processing!

You Did It! What to Expect After Filing

- A receipt notice will also be mailed to you. Once you have the receipt number, you can
 look up the expected processing times for TPS here and check the status of your
 individual case here.
- If you meet all the TPS criteria, you will receive an Approval Notice from USCIS indicating that you have Temporary Protected Status.
- If you applied for an EAD along with your TPS application and are approved, your EAD card will arrive in the mail.

The Whole Package: What To Submit for TPS Renewal

If you have previously received TPS and your country continues to be designated for TPS, you do not need to present extensive evidence in your re-registration filing (though USCIS may later request it). You may need to include additional documents if you have criminal convictions or any major changes since you last were granted TPS. Please consult an immigration attorney for help in these cases.

- Cover letter (see template)
- Form G-1145 to receive a text or e-mail notification when USCIS receives the application
- Completed and signed Form I-821
- Completed and signed Form I-765, Application for Employment Authorization, if applying for an EAD
- A copy of the front and back of your present EAD card
- **Checks** for fees




Paying the Filing Fees



- Because there are many variables, consult the <u>USCIS fee calculator</u> to find out the most up-to-date information on what you need to pay. If you are helping additional relatives file for TPS, check the fee calculator for each person to be sure to pay the right fee.
- The fees required for the EAD application can vary by:
 - Your age, (younger than 14, 14-65 years old, and 66 and older),
 - If you are seeking an initial TPS or a renewal TPS, and
 - whether you are requesting an Employment Authorization Document (EAD) using Form I-765 or not.
- Amazon will reimburse for Employees' EAD filing fees and biometric fees. For instructions on how to submit reimbursements, please visit the Welcome Door website.
- Be sure to enclose a separate check for EACH fee.

For example, if the fee calculator indicated you need to pay for the Form I-821, the Form I-765, and for biometrics, you would
write three separate checks and indicate in the "for" or "memo" line your A-Number and what fee the check covers as shown.



Fee Payment: Best Practices for Tracking

We recommend that you pay any fees associated with your TPS application by personal check for better tracking. The check should be made payable to "US Department of Homeland Security" as shown below. You can learn about additional ways to pay USCIS fees here.



- All documents in a foreign language must be accompanied by a certified English translation.
 - Do include high-quality color copies of the original with the certified translation into English on top.



- **X** Do not submit original documents to USCIS; a high-quality color scan of a document like your passport or a birth certificate is fine.
- A professional translator is not necessary, but the translator must certify and sign that he or she
 knows both English and the foreign language well enough to provide a faithful, correct
 translation.
- Translators can certify their translations by modifying the following language and inserting it at the end of the translated document along with their signature and the date of the translation:

I, [NAME], am fluent in the English and [INSERT LANGUAGE NAME] languages. I have made the above translation from a copy of the original document ["TITLE OR DESCRIPTION OF DOCUMENT"] in the [INSERT ORIGINAL LANGUAGE] language and hereby certify that it is a true and accurate translation to the best of my knowledge.

- For example, the following signed statement would properly certify a document's translation:
 - I, Maria Escobar-Padilla, am fluent in the English and Spanish languages. I have made the above translation from a copy of the original document "Venezuelan Birth Certificate of Juan Alvarez-Perez" in the Spanish language and hereby certify that it is a true and accurate translation to the best of my knowledge.

The words lawyer and attorney refer to the same job. Only lawyers who have a **valid bar license from a US state** or territory should practice law. There are many kinds of law. For asylum or other complex immigration filings, you will most likely want an **immigration attorney**, a person who specializes in US immigration law. Immigration lawyers may be in private practice on their own or they may work at a law firm or another organization like a non-profit or charity.

Accredited Representative

The US Department of Justice authorizes certain non-profit legal service providers to employ accredited representatives. Accredited representatives are not attorneys but are qualified to represent immigrants. Click here for the list of all active recognized organizations and their accredited representatives.



Where can I find immigration help? The following links are good starting points:

- The American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA) allows you to search for individual lawyers based on the type of help you need and language that the lawyer speaks. Lawyers on <u>AILA's Lawyer Search</u> are AILA members and have a currently valid state bar license.



Costs Vary.

- It is always a good idea to ask about the fees and any payment options in advance and agree to the price in writing.
- Some lawyers and organizations offer immigration legal services pro bono, meaning for free or at a low cost (often based on your income).

Trusting Your Immigration Counsel



This page offers some tips on how to avoid becoming a victim of immigration fraud and ensure that a legal representative is worthy of your trust.



Check that the legal representative you are considering has the right credentials.

- Attorneys must be properly licensed to practice law. This means they will have a bar license or number from a state or territory.
 - Because immigration laws are federal (and do not vary by state), immigration attorneys may be licensed to practice law in another state from the state where you live. You can ask the attorney to specify the states in which s/he is admitted.
 - If you are represented by law students through a university law clinic, those students should be supervised by a fully licensed attorney who can practice law.
- All accredited representatives are listed <u>here on the Department of Justice website.</u>
- Check here to make sure your legal representative **does not** appear on the list of people disciplined for or banned from practicing immigration law.



Other tips to protect yourself.



Be sure you have copies of or access to all filings made for you. You have a right to this information and may need it in the future.



- Do not sign blank forms or documents. Counsel must allow you to review the completed forms and
 accompanying materials before signing. You will be personally responsible for the information they contain.
- Do not pay for forms. All forms are available for free on the USCIS website.
- If your representative asks you to include or say something you know is not true, do not do it! Find new counsel immediately because this person is not honest. Lies on immigration forms can have serious consequences for your immigration case, and explaining that your counsel told you to lie will not keep those consequences from happening. Please do not risk it.



I have other pending immigration filings, such as asylum or family-based adjustment. Should I still file for TPS, and, if so, how do those filings interact?

If you applied for another immigration benefit but have not yet received a positive adjudication, we recommend that you apply for TPS if you qualify. TPS does not preclude you from securing other immigration benefits that you are eligible for but acts as a safety net while you wait. Applying for TPS has no effect on asylum or other applications, though an asylum officer or an Immigration Judge may ask whether you have applied for TPS.

Should I apply for TPS for my children also?

If your children were born in a country of origin that would qualify them for TPS, yes! We recommend you register them for TPS also. Every person, regardless of age, must submit a full and complete application, as there is no derivative status for TPS. If you have children who were born in the United States, they are US citizens by birth and do not require you to submit a TPS application on their behalf.

My relative arrived in the United States from a qualifying country of origin a few days after the continuous residence and physical date. Can they still apply for TPS if they meet all other requirements?

Unfortunately not, unless the TPS requirements for your country change. We encourage you to monitor the TPS country page relevant to your country to receive the latest information on any modifications to dates or requirements.

I have moved. How do I update my address with USCIS?

It is essential that you keep the US government up-to-date on where you move to ensure you receive notices, your EAD (if requested), and more. Notify the government as soon as you change your address. The form to change your address with USCIS is the Form AR-11, Alien's Change of Address. Complete this form online.

If you are in Immigration Court proceedings, you will also need to file a Form EOIR-33, Change of Address, using the <u>proper PDF for the immigration court</u> judging your case. As you will see on the form itself, you are required to send a copy of the EOIR-33 to the court **and** a proof of service to the Office of Chief Counsel for DHS/ICE. You can find the correct <u>mailing addresses for ICE counsel here</u>.

I missed the registration or re-registration deadlines to apply for TPS for my country. Can I still apply?

If you missed the registration period, you may still be able to file late if you meet certain conditions. Visit the <u>USCIS TPS website and select heading "Late Filing"</u> to learn more about what to do based on the situation that applies to you. Follow the instructions carefully. In some cases, you will need to fill out additional sections on the Form I-821.

What can I do if my TPS application is denied?

You may have a right to appeal, file a motion to re-open, or seek TPS from an Immigration judge. The USCIS denial notice will indicate whether you can appeal the decision or not. Visit the <u>USCIS TPS website and select heading "Appealing a Denial</u>" to better understand your options in case of a denial. We suggest seeking counsel from an immigration attorney if you choose to pursue TPS after receiving a denial.



We know that sometimes people will not have documents, especially if they may have fled their countries quickly or if records were damaged or lost due to disasters. Here we provide some alternative documentation ideas if you do not have documents from your home country.

- If a birth certificate is not available, you can **provide a document from a religious institution** where a religious rite occurred within two months of birth **that indicates the child's date of birth, the date of the ceremony, and the names of the parents**.
- School documents and census records may also be used when no other evidence is available.
- For TPS specifically, if you are struggling to find evidence that proves your entry and presence in the United States or cannot provide any of the alternatives above to establish that you meet the eligibility criteria, we recommend that you consult with a qualified immigration attorney who can help you assemble alternative evidence.
- In some cases, you may be able to submit affidavits (written signed statements) from individuals who can swear they have personal knowledge of your birth, nationality, etc.
 - Affidavits must be signed and should include the person's full name, address, date and place of birth, and relationship to you, and provide relevant details and how they acquired the knowledge.
